
Connecting California Teachers

Since 2010, UCCI has conducted **34 UCCI Institutes** and **33 UCCI Teacher Exchanges**, helping **more than 1,300 educators** learn about, create, and prepare to teach integrated courses.

UCCI Develops Teacher Leaders

In addition to facilitating teacher learning and collaboration, UCCI also trains educators to serve in **paid leadership roles at our events**. In fact, **11% of UCCI participants have advanced** to facilitate teams or provide expert content guidance at UCCI Institutes, or to lead curriculum development at a Teacher Exchange.


UCCI Courses at a Glance

- ★ **We.thePeople: American Government and Cybersecurity (UC-designated honors)** – Students examine how the U.S. government structures and policies related to a citizen’s right to privacy intersect with the role of cybersecurity professionals in a democracy
- ★ **Forensic Biology** – Students study biology and earth science by examining how biological evidence is used to solve crime and analyzing how biogeological processes affect the preservation and viability of evidence



UCCI History

University of California Curriculum Integration (UCCI) is an initiative of Academic Preparation and Relations with Schools and Colleges – Undergraduate Admissions at UC Office of the President. Funding for UCCI is administered by the California Department of Education, UC's partner agency.

UCCI assists California high schools with the development and implementation of integrated curriculum – courses uniting academic study with Career Technical Education (CTE), to help prepare students for success in college, career and life.

UCCI's first program, the UCCI Institutes, launched in 2010, with funding provided by the CTE Pathways Initiative (SB 70), which addressed the need for greater CTE representation across the "a-g" subjects.

Since then, UCCI has added another program, the Teacher Exchange, which has helped more than 200 high school teachers prepare to teach a UCCI course. And UCCI will soon launch a Teacher Mentor program, matching an experienced UCCI teacher with someone new to teaching the same course.

As a result of UCCI's work connecting California teachers, more than 475,000 CA high school students now have access to the rigor and relevance of this unique curriculum.
